

HEAD COACH



JOE EADIE returned as the head men's golf coach at Springfield College for his 13th season in 2006. Eadie is the head golf professional at the Fenway Golf Range in nearby East Longmeadow, and is in the process of becoming a PGA Professional. A native of Springfield, Eadie is a graduate of Putnam High School, where he was a baseball, soccer, and wrestling standout.

Eadie has competed in several professional tournaments. He won the Kinny Open Tournament in Hartford, Connecticut in September 1997. He also finished in the top 10 at the Boston Open Tournament on three different occasions. He previously played on the Silver State Tour in Las Vegas, Nevada, and the Golden State Tour in California. In the summer of 1998, Eadie played golf with former President George Bush

and 1997 PGA Champion Davis Love III.

Highlights of Eadie's tenure at Springfield College include capturing the third straight City Championship over American International College and Western New England College in 1997, winning the first CAC Tournament crown, and qualifying for its second straight Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Tournament in 1996. Springfield also finished first at the Franklin Pierce College Invitational Tournament, and fourth among 17 teams at the Massachusetts Intercollegiate Golf Tournament Championship in 1997.

More recently, the Pride hosted the 2005 ECAC Division III Championships at Hampden Country Club in Hampden, Mass. At that tourney, Eadie's squad tallied a team total of 315 strokes to finish in a tie for fifth out of 19 competing teams. SC's total of 315 for the day was just nine off the leader (Salem State, 306). Also in the fall of 2005, the Pride finished third out of nine squads at the Blazers' Invitational, hosted by Elms College at Chicopee Country Club.

2006 SEASON IN REVIEW

The men's golf team had an extremely successful 2006 campaign, including a win at the Franklin Pierce Autumn Invitational held at the Shattuck Golf Club in Jaffrey, N.H. Sophomore **Greg Levings** carded a 76 to earn medalist honors for the team. Just one week earlier, Levings fired a four-over-par 75 at the Elms Invitational to take third place as an individual. The team finished in third place in a field of eight schools.

Early in the season, senior **Andrew Wright** recorded a 68 on the second day of competition at the Williams Invitational. Wright's score was one stroke off the Taconic Country Club record, which was first established 50 years ago. His score was the day's best mark as he paced the Pride to a ninth-place finish among 20 teams. At the City Championships, Wright carded a 76, tying him for medalist honors. The Pride finished second to WNEC by a mere two strokes, and ahead of AIC by 26 strokes. Springfield College golf finished its season in a tie for 19th place (of 43 teams) at the New England Championships.

Bryan Anderson, Brian Ciravolo, Michael LaJoie, and Joe Powers scored well throughout the season, rounding out the team's top six. As sophomores, Anderson and LaJoie are expected to continue to make huge contributions to the aspiring Pride golf team for two more seasons.
